# Preparing for A Level English Literature



The first module that you will study on the A Level English Literature course is called 'Modern Times'.

In this unit, you'll study a drama text, a novel and a collection of poetry, all of which have been written after 1945; you'll have to consider how these texts have been shaped by their modern contexts e.g social and political changes, significant events, shifting attitudes and ideologies.

To prepare you for this, the English Department would like you to do the following tasks:

- 1) Produce a collage to represent 'Modern Times'. Use a combination of research into key events (social/political e.g the Civil Rights Movement, legalisation of gay marriage, #metoo) since 1945, but also your own interpretation of the world in which we are currently living you've probably got some interesting ideas and views about this at the moment! Make it bold, visual and include any short snippets of text that you think capture something important e.g newspaper headlines, quotes from famous people etc. Your collage can either be physically made on a sheet of A3 or you could do it as a Powerpoint slide/Prezi; it's entirely up to you.
- 2) Choose at least 1 text from the Modern Times Text Recommendations list (read more than 1, if you have time) or read another title by one of the writers listed. Some of the suggested books have good film adaptations so you might want to choose one with a film attached and watch this too (though check the age certificate and make sure you get parental permission first if necessary). As you read, make some notes on how typical modern times themes are explored.

Themes might include:

- Identity
- Fragmented society
- Race and Prejudice

- Gender
- Feminism
- Conflict
- Isolation
- Oppression
- Alienation
- Truth (and questioning 'truth')

## 3) Prepare an interesting way to present your book to the rest of your A level English class in

**September**. Be imaginative and get creative! You could choose to: recreate a scene and do a short film; write and perform/record a song; create a piece of artwork/ an artefact; design and make a

costume or some props; anything else you'd like to do! Please make sure that you complete your work to the highest standard you can manage. You will be expected to present it during the first 2 weeks of the A Level course in September.
