### **Cultures Day**


#### Drama

# Ten Tors/Duke of Edinburgh Award

The weekend of 9<sup>th</sup> -11<sup>th</sup> May saw the return of the incredible Ten Tors Challenge. An epic event organised by the Army with support from other organisations. In the lead-up, our teams braved months of tough training: navigating Dartmoor through thick fog, camping in sub-zero temperatures, and pushing themselves both physically and mentally. When the big weekend arrived, they were met with milder weather thankfully.

At 07:00 hours on Saturday, the sound of the starting cannons echoed across the north moor. Our three 35-mile teams, alongside both our 45 and 55-mile teams (the latter a fantastic collaboration with Honiton Community College) set off with focus and determination and by Sunday, all teams had successfully completed their routes. What an achievement! Congratulations to all involved, you've done yourselves

and our school proud!

At the same time, the Duke of Edinburgh's Award expedition season is underway. Year 12 students have already completed their practice Gold expedition on Dartmoor and are now preparing for their qualifying expedition in the Brecon Beacons this July. The Year 10 Silver practice expeditions, also on Dartmoor, have also commenced ahead of their qualifying trek across Exmoor next term. Lastly, Year 9s, are preparing for their Bronze Qualifying expeditions in the equally stunning South Hams.



Of course, the expeditions are just one part of the Duke of Edinburgh experience. Throughout the year, our students have volunteered in their communities, taken on physical challenges and developed new skills. We're so incredibly proud of you too!

# **Holocaust Witness Talk**

There was an amazing turnout at the Holocaust Witness talk at lunchtime on Thursday 1<sup>st</sup> May, with students from every year attending. Judith Hayman of Generation2Generation spoke to a packed Hub about her family's experience of persecution when the Nazis took over Austria in 1938, and about how her mother escaped to England while many relatives died in death camps. We are very grateful to Judith for such a moving, powerful talk and also proud of Isabella Passarelli of Year 12 for inviting Judith and organising the whole event, which grew out of the participation of several of our Year 12s in the Holocaust Education Trust's Lessons from Auschwitz visit to the former death camp in Poland.



# **LawSoc Courts Visit**

Ten LawSoc Year 12s visited Exeter Courts on 14<sup>th</sup> May, for an eye-opening and engrossing immersion in the justice system.

Clerk of the Court Lisa Roberts arranged our visit and welcomed us, and we began with a tour of the cells underneath the Courts and a sobering chat with the security team who handle the flow of remand prisoners and sentenced offenders.

We were then very fortunate to have an hour with Judge Climie, who talked about the courts system, his own career and role as a judge, and about the case we would see, which was a jury trial for sexual assault. We witnessed the barristers negotiating with the judge and each other about how witnesses would be handled, and the prosecution advocate also shared with us about his role and how he prepares to examine witnesses. Once the jury was brought in, we watched the case from the public gallery, taking in the witnesses' evidence and the way they were questioned by the barristers.

At the end of the visit, Judge Climie debriefed the group, discussing what we had seen and answering questions.

It was a very impactful day and we are very grateful to all those who made it possible for us to visit - definitely one of the highlights of a busy LawSoc year.

### **LAMDA Lessons**

LAMDA lessons have recently started in the Drama Department and we are already celebrating successes!

Both Eleanor Reifler and Cecily Fox passed their Grade 6 exams with distinction.
