Do you really know what your child is viewing online? You may have seen recently in the news that two teenagers were convicted of the murder of Brianna Ghey. A review is being undertaken into this, inclusive of the amount of time that the convicted teenagers spent on their mobile phones, using whats app to plan this awful attack. There was also evidence that they had viewed inappropriate content on the Dark Web. The mother of Brianna Ghey is campaigning to create separate mobile phones for children and adults, due to the impact of social media on children. We continually remind parents of the importance of checking their children's phone, restricting screen time and not allowing them to have their phones in their bedrooms overnight. ## CHILDREN'S MENTAL HEALTH WEEK 2024.



#### **County Lines Gangs**

We continue to remind our students of our contextual safeguarding risks through PSHE and safeguarding assemblies. Country lines is when drug gangs use children to transport drugs and money around the country. This tends to start off on a local basis but can then lead to children being sent all over the country. One of the main strategies of the gangs is to break the relationships between home and the child. Research has shown that gangs have broadened their 'targeted' children to females, who come from more affluent backgrounds. Unfortunately, all children are at risk of exploitation, so it is important that parents know the signs to look out for, which are -

- Coming home with an extra mobile phone
- New clothes such as trainers / watches and jewellery that you have not purchased
- Coming home with unexplained injuries that cannot be accounted for
- A change in behaviour, detaching from the family unit and becoming more aggressive in their tone / behaviour.
- Spending more time away from the family home.
